

Attestation for Use of Standing Prescription Order
Dr. Ryan Westergaard, Chief Medical Officer and State Epidemiologist for Communicable Diseases
For trained personnel to collect and/or analyze specimens for COVID-19 testing

In signing this form, I attest that I have reviewed and will comply with the following requirements to use Dr. Westergaard’s standing [POC Antigen order](#) and/or [PCR order](#):

- Tests conducted under the standing order must be used for patients who meet DHS-established eligibility criteria.
 - Individuals ages 12 months and older who have symptoms suggestive of COVID-19; or
 - Individuals ages 12 months and older who have been in close contact of a person with COVID-19, regardless of symptoms; or
 - Individuals ages 12 months and older without symptoms, as part of a screening program that is done in accordance with recommendations by DHS or CDC.
- Organizations administering point of care tests:
 - Must have a CLIA certificate of waiver. For a multi-site or mobile CLIA certificate of waiver, submit one attestation form for the entire organization to support all testing sites. The CLIA Certificate of Waiver Laboratory Director is responsible for signing this form.
 - Must ensure patients have access to confirmatory molecular/polymerase chain reaction (PCR) testing, when indicated:
 - Symptomatic patients who have negative antigen test results are recommended to have a lab-based molecular (PCR) test within 48 hours.
 - Asymptomatic patients without recent exposure to COVID-19 (for example, participants in asymptomatic screening programs) who have a positive antigen test are recommended to have a lab-based molecular (PCR) test within 48 hours.

Indicate one or more locations where confirmatory tests are available to patients: (for example, on-site, healthcare provider, community test site, local pharmacy, at-home collection kits):

- Must submit all negative and positive point of care results and required patient-level data to public health agencies within 24 hours of test administration. Test results must be reported to the State of WI and to federal authorities (HHS). Reporting [account set-up](#) and [guidance](#) is available from DHS.
- Patients must be provided with appropriate educational materials approved by DHS. Parental consent must be obtained for patients ages 1-17 years and patients ages 14-17 must also provide verbal assent themselves.
- Tests must be administered by trained personnel in accordance with instructions specified by the manufacturer.
